They are thoroughly enjoying our recount unit in English, gathering content for their newspaper reports. They also examined techniques of writing an interesting newspaper headline and created their own. In maths we have continued with comparing, adding and subtracting capacity and volume. We started to make sweet dispensers which are fun and creative. We created a double page spread in Science to display learning on the digestive system and we learnt all about Ancient Roman life in Topic. In RE we examined existing prayers and wrote our own versions. Changing emotions were examined in PSHE and the children played games to tell a time when they felt the differing emotions. Kingfishers



Kingfishers have been extremely busy this week. In English we analysed the structure of newspaper reports. In maths we thought about angles (Y4) and measured lines to the nearest cm and mm (Y3). We had a very special RE lesson in which the children wrote their own prayers using contrasting language. Some children chose to read them aloud which they did beautifully. The children helped to compose a piece for the latest edition of our school newspaper - so look out for that when it's published! In design and technology, the children planned the sequence of work that they plan to follow next week when making their innovative sweet dispensers.

Owls



This week in Owls we have been continuing our learning on the Ancient Romans by exploring where they settled around Britain. The children produced some lovely maps that contained lots of details about the different settlements including Ribchester. In Science we pulled all our learning on teeth and digestion together to produce wonderfully detailed webpages full of information to share with others. In English Owls have written their own newspaper article based on the attempted invasion of Britain by the Romans in 40AD. Their sweet dispensers have been finished and I am really impressed with the time, care and effort you have taken over them. Looking forward to our last week together as Owls next week.

Robins



This week, we have played rounders again in our P.E. lesson and seen some amazing bowling, catching and batting. In science, we have been describing and classifying some very unusual animals and plants. We have begun a new unit in English, reading and writing poems about the sea. In maths, we have been converting units of measure and telling the time. We learned how to say the four points of the compass in Spanish and used this to write some sentences about where we live. In music, we began to learn how to sign The Fresh Prince of Bel Air using British Sign Language as well as playing some fun games involving rhythm. In R.E., we learned about the journeys of St. Paul around the Mediterranean and wrote a letter to a friend encouraging them with something they were struggling with. In maths the children in year 5 have consolidated their understanding of fractions, decimals and percentages and the children in year 6 have focused on all aspects of pie charts. In English the children produced a range of work including a double page spread about the Titanic. The children have reflected on the year they have had and written some wonderful reflection prayers in RE. The children in year 6 enjoyed watching the Diocesan Year 6 Leavers' Service and considered a range of important questions based on the future. In PSHE the children also reflected on the factors that impact on their decisions as they get older and how they approach the opportunities given to them.
